

## NAG Library Function Document

### nag\_sparse\_herm\_sol (f11jsc)

## 1 Purpose

nag\_sparse\_herm\_sol (f11jsc) solves a complex sparse Hermitian system of linear equations, represented in symmetric coordinate storage format, using a conjugate gradient or Lanczos method, without preconditioning, with Jacobi or with SSOR preconditioning.

## 3 Description

nag\_sparse\_herm\_sol (f11jsc) solves a complex sparse Hermitian linear system of equations

$$Ax = b,$$

using a preconditioned conjugate gradient method (see Barrett *et al.* (1994)), or a preconditioned Lanczos method based on the algorithm SYMMLQ (see Paige and Saunders (1975)). The conjugate gradient method is more efficient if  $A$  is positive definite, but may fail to converge for indefinite matrices. In this case the Lanczos method should be used instead. For further details see Barrett *et al.* (1994).

nag\_sparse\_herm\_sol (f11jsc) allows the following choices for the preconditioner:

- no preconditioning;
- Jacobi preconditioning (see Young (1971));
- symmetric successive-over-relaxation (SSOR) preconditioning (see Young (1971)).

For incomplete Cholesky (IC) preconditioning see nag\_sparse\_herm\_chol\_sol (f11jqc).

The matrix  $A$  is represented in symmetric coordinate storage (SCS) format (see Section 2.1.2 in the f11 Chapter Introduction) in the arrays **a**, **irow** and **icol**. The array **a** holds the nonzero entries in the lower triangular part of the matrix, while **irow** and **icol** hold the corresponding row and column indices.

## 5 Arguments

- 1: **method** – Nag\_SparseSym\_Method *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies the iterative method to be used.  
**method** = Nag\_SparseSym\_CG  
Conjugate gradient method.  
**method** = Nag\_SparseSym\_SYMMLQ  
Lanczos method (SYMMLQ).  
*Constraint:* **method** = Nag\_SparseSym\_CG or Nag\_SparseSym\_SYMMLQ.
- 2: **precon** – Nag\_SparseSym\_PrecType *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies the type of preconditioning to be used.  
**precon** = Nag\_SparseSym\_NoPrec  
No preconditioning.  
**precon** = Nag\_SparseSym\_JacPrec  
Jacobi.  
**precon** = Nag\_SparseSym\_SSORPrec  
Symmetric successive-over-relaxation (SSOR).  
*C o n s t r a i n t :* **precon** = Nag\_SparseSym\_NoPrec, Nag\_SparseSym\_JacPrec or Nag\_SparseSym\_SSORPrec.
- 3: **n** – Integer *Input*  
*On entry:*  $n$ , the order of the matrix  $A$ .  
*Constraint:* **n**  $\geq 1$ .
- 4: **nnz** – Integer *Input*  
*On entry:* the number of nonzero elements in the lower triangular part of the matrix  $A$ .  
*Constraint:*  $1 \leq \text{nnz} \leq \text{n} \times (\text{n} + 1)/2$ .
- 5: **a[nnz]** – const Complex *Input*  
*On entry:* the nonzero elements of the lower triangular part of the matrix  $A$ , ordered by increasing row index, and by increasing column index within each row. Multiple entries for the same row and column indices are not permitted. The function nag\_sparse\_herm\_sort (f11zpc) may be used to order the elements in this way.
- 6: **irow[nnz]** – const Integer *Input*  
7: **icol[nnz]** – const Integer *Input*  
*On entry:* the row and column indices of the nonzero elements supplied in array **a**.  
*Constraints:*  
**irow** and **icol** must satisfy these constraints (which may be imposed by a call to nag\_sparse\_herm\_sort (f11zpc)):  
 $1 \leq \text{irow}[i] \leq \text{n}$  and  $1 \leq \text{icol}[i] \leq \text{irow}[i]$ , for  $i = 0, 1, \dots, \text{nnz} - 1$ ;  
 $\text{irow}[i - 1] < \text{irow}[i]$  or  $\text{irow}[i - 1] = \text{irow}[i]$  and  $\text{icol}[i - 1] < \text{icol}[i]$ , for  $i = 1, 2, \dots, \text{nnz} - 1$ .

8:	<b>omega</b> – double	<i>Input</i>
<i>On entry:</i> if <b>precon</b> = Nag_SparseSym_SSOPPrec, <b>omega</b> is the relaxation parameter $\omega$ to be used in the SSOR method. Otherwise <b>omega</b> need not be initialized.		
<i>Constraint:</i> $0.0 < \text{omega} < 2.0$ .		
9:	<b>b[n]</b> – const Complex	<i>Input</i>
<i>On entry:</i> the right-hand side vector $b$ .		
10:	<b>tol</b> – double	<i>Input</i>
<i>On entry:</i> the required tolerance. Let $x_k$ denote the approximate solution at iteration $k$ , and $r_k$ the corresponding residual. The algorithm is considered to have converged at iteration $k$ if		
$\ r_k\ _\infty \leq \tau \times (\ b\ _\infty + \ A\ _\infty \ x_k\ _\infty)$ .		
If <b>tol</b> $\leq 0.0$ , $\tau = \max(\sqrt{\epsilon}, 10\epsilon, \sqrt{n}\epsilon)$ is used, where $\epsilon$ is the <b>machine precision</b> . Otherwise $\tau = \max(\text{tol}, 10\epsilon, \sqrt{n}\epsilon)$ is used.		
<i>Constraint:</i> <b>tol</b> $< 1.0$ .		
11:	<b>maxitn</b> – Integer	<i>Input</i>
<i>On entry:</i> the maximum number of iterations allowed.		
<i>Constraint:</i> <b>maxitn</b> $\geq 1$ .		
12:	<b>x[n]</b> – Complex	<i>Input/Output</i>
<i>On entry:</i> an initial approximation to the solution vector $x$ .		
<i>On exit:</i> an improved approximation to the solution vector $x$ .		
13:	<b>rnorm</b> – double *	<i>Output</i>
<i>On exit:</i> the final value of the residual norm $\ r_k\ $ , where $k$ is the output value of <b>itn</b> .		
14:	<b>itn</b> – Integer *	<i>Output</i>
<i>On exit:</i> the number of iterations carried out.		
15:	<b>rdiag[n]</b> – double	<i>Output</i>
<i>On exit:</i> the elements of the diagonal matrix $D^{-1}$ , where $D$ is the diagonal part of $A$ . Note that since $A$ is Hermitian the elements of $D^{-1}$ are necessarily real.		
16:	<b>fail</b> – NagError *	<i>Input/Output</i>
The NAG error argument (see Section 2.7 in How to Use the NAG Library and its Documentation).		

## 6 Error Indicators and Warnings

### NE\_ACCURACY

The required accuracy could not be obtained. However, a reasonable accuracy has been achieved and further iterations could not improve the result.

### NE\_ALLOC\_FAIL

Dynamic memory allocation failed.

**NE\_BAD\_PARAM**

On entry, argument  $\langle value \rangle$  had an illegal value.

**NE\_COEFF\_NOT\_POS\_DEF**

The matrix of the coefficients **a** appears not to be positive definite. The computation cannot continue.

**NE\_CONVERGENCE**

The solution has not converged after  $\langle value \rangle$  iterations.

**NE\_INT**

On entry, **maxitn** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **maxitn**  $\geq 1$ .

On entry, **n** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **n**  $\geq 1$ .

On entry, **nnz** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **nnz**  $\geq 1$ .

**NE\_INT\_2**

On entry, **nnz** =  $\langle value \rangle$  and **n** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **nnz**  $\leq n \times (n + 1)/2$

**NE\_INTERNAL\_ERROR**

An internal error has occurred in this function. Check the function call and any array sizes. If the call is correct then please contact NAG for assistance.

Constraint: **icol**[ $I - 1$ ]  $\geq 1$  and **icol**[ $I - 1$ ]  $\leq$  **irow**[ $I - 1$ ].

On entry,  $i = \langle value \rangle$ , **irow**[ $i - 1$ ] =  $\langle value \rangle$  and **n** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **irow**[ $i - 1$ ]  $\geq 1$  and **irow**[ $i - 1$ ]  $\leq$  **n**.

**NE\_NO\_LICENCE**

Your licence key may have expired or may not have been installed correctly.

**NE\_NOT\_STRICTLY\_INCREASING**

On entry, **a**[ $i - 1$ ] is out of order:  $i = \langle value \rangle$ .

On entry, the location (**irow**[ $I - 1$ ], **icol**[ $I - 1$ ]) is a duplicate:  $I = \langle value \rangle$ . Consider calling nag\_sparse\_herm\_sort (f11zpc) to reorder and sum or remove duplicates.

**NE\_PRECOND\_NOT\_POS\_DEF**

The preconditioner appears not to be positive definite. The computation cannot continue.

**NE\_REAL**

On entry, **omega** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint:  $0.0 < \text{omega} < 2.0$ .

On entry, **tol** =  $\langle value \rangle$ .

Constraint: **tol** < 1.0.

**NE\_ZERO\_DIAG\_ELEM**

The matrix  $A$  has a non-real diagonal entry in row  $\langle value \rangle$ .

The matrix  $A$  has a zero diagonal entry in row  $\langle value \rangle$ .

The matrix  $A$  has no diagonal entry in row  $\langle value \rangle$ .

**7 Accuracy**

On successful termination, the final residual  $r_k = b - Ax_k$ , where  $k = \text{itn}$ , satisfies the termination criterion

$$\|r_k\|_\infty \leq \tau \times (\|b\|_\infty + \|A\|_\infty \|x_k\|_\infty).$$

The value of the final residual norm is returned in **rnorm**.

**8 Parallelism and Performance**

`nag_sparse_herm_sol` (f11jsc) is threaded by NAG for parallel execution in multithreaded implementations of the NAG Library.

`nag_sparse_herm_sol` (f11jsc) makes calls to BLAS and/or LAPACK routines, which may be threaded within the vendor library used by this implementation. Consult the documentation for the vendor library for further information.

Please consult the x06 Chapter Introduction for information on how to control and interrogate the OpenMP environment used within this function. Please also consult the Users' Note for your implementation for any additional implementation-specific information.

**9 Further Comments**

The time taken by `nag_sparse_herm_sol` (f11jsc) for each iteration is roughly proportional to **nnz**. One iteration with the Lanczos method (SYMMLQ) requires a slightly larger number of operations than one iteration with the conjugate gradient method.

The number of iterations required to achieve a prescribed accuracy cannot easily be determined *a priori*, as it can depend dramatically on the conditioning and spectrum of the preconditioned matrix of the coefficients  $\bar{A} = M^{-1}A$ .

**10 Example**

This example solves a complex sparse Hermitian positive definite system of equations using the conjugate gradient method, with SSOR preconditioning.
