

## NAG Library Function Document

### nag\_ztfsm (f16zlc)

#### 1 Purpose

nag\_ztfsm (f16zlc) performs one of the matrix-matrix operations

$$\begin{aligned} B &\leftarrow \alpha A^{-1}B, & B &\leftarrow \alpha A^{-H}B, \\ B &\leftarrow \alpha BA^{-1} \quad \text{or} \quad B \leftarrow \alpha BA^{-H}, \end{aligned}$$

where  $A$  is a complex triangular matrix stored in Rectangular Full Packed (RFP) format,  $B$  is an  $m$  by  $n$  complex matrix, and  $\alpha$  is a complex scalar.  $A^{-H}$  denotes  $(A^H)^{-1}$  or equivalently  $(A^{-1})^H$ .

No test for singularity or near-singularity of  $A$  is included in this function. Such tests must be performed before calling this function.

#### 3 Description

nag\_ztfsm (f16zlc) solves (for  $X$ ) a triangular linear system of one of the forms

$$\begin{aligned} AX &= \alpha B, & A^H X &= \alpha B, \\ XA &= \alpha B \quad \text{or} \quad XA^H = \alpha B, \end{aligned}$$

where  $A$  is a complex triangular matrix stored in RFP format,  $B$ ,  $X$  are  $m$  by  $n$  complex matrices, and  $\alpha$  is a complex scalar. The RFP storage format is described in Section 3.3.3 in the f07 Chapter Introduction.

#### 5 Arguments

1: **order** – Nag\_OrderType *Input*

*On entry:* the **order** argument specifies the two-dimensional storage scheme being used, i.e., row-major ordering or column-major ordering. C language defined storage is specified by **order** = Nag\_RowMajor. See Section 2.3.1.3 in How to Use the NAG Library and its Documentation for a more detailed explanation of the use of this argument.

*Constraint:* **order** = Nag\_RowMajor or Nag\_ColMajor.

- 2: **transr** – Nag\_RFP\_Store *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies whether the normal RFP representation of  $A$  or its conjugate transpose is stored.  
**transr** = Nag\_RFP\_Normal  
The matrix  $A$  is stored in normal RFP format.  
**transr** = Nag\_RFP\_ConjTrans  
The conjugate transpose of the RFP representation of the matrix  $A$  is stored.  
*Constraint:* **transr** = Nag\_RFP\_Normal or Nag\_RFP\_ConjTrans.
- 3: **side** – Nag\_SideType *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies whether  $B$  is operated on from the left or the right, or similarly whether  $A$  (or its transpose) appears to the left or right of the solution matrix in the linear system to be solved.  
**side** = Nag\_LeftSide  
 $B$  is pre-multiplied from the left. The system to be solved has the form  $AX = \alpha B$  or  $A^T X = \alpha B$ .  
**side** = Nag\_RightSide  
 $B$  is post-multiplied from the right. The system to be solved has the form  $XA = \alpha B$  or  $XA^T = \alpha B$ .  
*Constraint:* **side** = Nag\_LeftSide or Nag\_RightSide.
- 4: **uplo** – Nag\_UptoType *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies whether  $A$  is upper or lower triangular.  
**uplo** = Nag\_Upper  
 $A$  is upper triangular.  
**uplo** = Nag\_Lower  
 $A$  is lower triangular.  
*Constraint:* **uplo** = Nag\_Upper or Nag\_Lower.
- 5: **trans** – Nag\_TransType *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies whether the operation involves  $A^{-1}$  or  $A^{-H}$ , i.e., whether or not  $A$  is transpose conjugated in the linear system to be solved.  
**trans** = Nag\_NoTrans  
The operation involves  $A^{-1}$ , i.e.,  $A$  is not transpose conjugated.  
**trans** = Nag\_ConjTrans  
The operation involves  $A^{-H}$ , i.e.,  $A$  is transpose conjugated.  
*Constraint:* **trans** = Nag\_NoTrans or Nag\_ConjTrans.
- 6: **diag** – Nag\_DiagType *Input*  
*On entry:* specifies whether  $A$  has nonunit or unit diagonal elements.  
**diag** = Nag\_NonUnitDiag  
The diagonal elements of  $A$  are stored explicitly.  
**diag** = Nag\_UnitDiag  
The diagonal elements of  $A$  are assumed to be 1, the corresponding elements of **ar** are not referenced.  
*Constraint:* **diag** = Nag\_NonUnitDiag or Nag\_UnitDiag.

7:	<b>m</b> – Integer	<i>Input</i>
	<i>On entry:</i> $m$ , the number of rows of the matrix $B$ .	
	<i>Constraint:</i> $\mathbf{m} \geq 0$ .	
8:	<b>n</b> – Integer	<i>Input</i>
	<i>On entry:</i> $n$ , the number of columns of the matrix $B$ .	
	<i>Constraint:</i> $\mathbf{n} \geq 0$ .	
9:	<b>alpha</b> – Complex	<i>Input</i>
	<i>On entry:</i> the scalar $\alpha$ .	
10:	<b>ar</b> [ <i>dim</i> ] – const Complex	<i>Input</i>
	<b>Note:</b> the dimension, <i>dim</i> , of the array <b>ar</b> must be at least	
	$\max(1, \mathbf{m} \times (\mathbf{m} + 1)/2)$ when <b>side</b> = Nag_LeftSide;	
	$\max(1, \mathbf{n} \times (\mathbf{n} + 1)/2)$ when <b>side</b> = Nag_RightSide.	
	<i>On entry:</i> the $m$ by $m$ triangular matrix $A$ if <b>side</b> = Nag_LeftSide or the $n$ by $n$ triangular matrix $A$ if <b>side</b> = Nag_RightSide, stored in RFP format (as specified by <b>transr</b> ). The storage format is described in detail in Section 3.3.3 in the f07 Chapter Introduction. If <b>alpha</b> = 0.0, <b>ar</b> is not referenced.	
11:	<b>b</b> [ <i>dim</i> ] – Complex	<i>Input/Output</i>
	<b>Note:</b> the dimension, <i>dim</i> , of the array <b>b</b> must be at least	
	$\max(1, \mathbf{pdb} \times \mathbf{n})$ when <b>order</b> = Nag_ColMajor;	
	$\max(1, \mathbf{m} \times \mathbf{pdb})$ when <b>order</b> = Nag_RowMajor.	
	<i>On entry:</i> the $m$ by $n$ matrix $B$ .	
	If <b>alpha</b> = 0, <b>b</b> need not be set.	
	<i>On exit:</i> the updated matrix $B$ , or similarly the solution matrix $X$ .	
	If <b>order</b> = Nag_ColMajor, $B_{ij}$ is stored in <b>b</b> [( <i>j</i> – 1) × <b>pdb</b> + <i>i</i> – 1].	
	If <b>order</b> = Nag_RowMajor, $B_{ij}$ is stored in <b>b</b> [( <i>i</i> – 1) × <b>pdb</b> + <i>j</i> – 1].	
12:	<b>pdb</b> – Integer	<i>Input</i>
	<i>On entry:</i> the stride separating row or column elements (depending on the value of <b>order</b> ) in the array <b>b</b> .	
	<i>Constraints:</i>	
	if <b>order</b> = Nag_ColMajor, <b>pdb</b> $\geq \max(1, \mathbf{m})$ ;	
	if <b>order</b> = Nag_RowMajor, <b>pdb</b> $\geq \max(1, \mathbf{n})$ .	
13:	<b>fail</b> – NagError *	<i>Input/Output</i>
	The NAG error argument (see Section 2.7 in How to Use the NAG Library and its Documentation).

This example reads in the upper triangular part of a symmetric matrix  $A$  which it converts to RFP format. It also reads in  $\alpha$  and a 4 by 3 matrix  $B$  and then performs the matrix-matrix operation  $B \leftarrow \alpha A^{-1}B$ .
