# NAG Library Routine Document <br> S18AQF 

Note: before using this routine, please read the Users' Note for your implementation to check the interpretation of bold italicised terms and other implementation-dependent details.

## 1 Purpose

S18AQF returns an array of values of the modified Bessel function $K_{0}(x)$.

## 2 Specification

```
SUBROUTINE S18AQF (N, X, F, IVALID, IFAIL)
INTEGER N, IVALID(N), IFAIL
REAL (KIND=nag_wp) X(N), F(N)
```


## 3 Description

S18AQF evaluates an approximation to the modified Bessel function of the second kind $K_{0}\left(x_{i}\right)$ for an array of arguments $x_{i}$, for $i=1,2, \ldots, n$.
Note: $K_{0}(x)$ is undefined for $x \leq 0$ and the routine will fail for such arguments.
The routine is based on five Chebyshev expansions:
For $0<x \leq 1$,

$$
K_{0}(x)=-\ln x \sum_{r=0} a_{r} T_{r}(t)+\sum_{r=0} b_{r} T_{r}(t), \quad \text { where } t=2 x^{2}-1
$$

For $1<x \leq 2$,

$$
K_{0}(x)=e^{-x} \sum_{r=0} c_{r} T_{r}(t), \quad \text { where } t=2 x-3
$$

For $2<x \leq 4$,

$$
K_{0}(x)=e^{-x} \sum_{r=0} d_{r} T_{r}(t), \quad \text { where } t=x-3 .
$$

For $x>4$,

$$
K_{0}(x)=\frac{e^{-x}}{\sqrt{x}} \sum_{r=0} e_{r} T_{r}(t), \text { where } t=\frac{9-x}{1+x} .
$$

For $x$ near zero, $K_{0}(x) \simeq-\gamma-\ln \left(\frac{x}{2}\right)$, where $\gamma$ denotes Euler's constant. This approximation is used when $x$ is sufficiently small for the result to be correct to machine precision.

For large $x$, where there is a danger of underflow due to the smallness of $K_{0}$, the result is set exactly to zero.

## 5 Parameters

1: N - INTEGER Input
On entry: $n$, the number of points.
Constraint: $\mathrm{N} \geq 0$.
2: $\mathrm{X}(\mathrm{N})$ - REAL (KIND=nag_wp) array Input
On entry: the argument $x_{i}$ of the function, for $i=1,2, \ldots, \mathrm{~N}$.
Constraint: $\mathrm{X}(i)>0.0$, for $i=1,2, \ldots, \mathrm{~N}$.
3: $\quad \mathrm{F}(\mathrm{N})-$ REAL (KIND=nag_wp) array
Output
On exit: $K_{0}\left(x_{i}\right)$, the function values.
4: $\quad \operatorname{IVALID}(\mathrm{N})$ - INTEGER array
On exit: $\operatorname{IVALID}(i)$ contains the error code for $x_{i}$, for $i=1,2, \ldots, \mathrm{~N}$.
$\operatorname{IVALID}(i)=0$
No error.
$\operatorname{IVALID}(i)=1$
$x_{i} \leq 0.0, K_{0}\left(x_{i}\right)$ is undefined. $\mathrm{F}(i)$ contains 0.0 .
5: IFAIL - INTEGER
Input/Output
On entry: IFAIL must be set to $0,-1$ or 1 . If you are unfamiliar with this parameter you should refer to Section 3.3 in the Essential Introduction for details.
For environments where it might be inappropriate to halt program execution when an error is detected, the value -1 or 1 is recommended. If the output of error messages is undesirable, then the value 1 is recommended. Otherwise, if you are not familiar with this parameter, the recommended value is 0 . When the value -1 or 1 is used it is essential to test the value of IFAIL on exit.
On exit: IFAIL $=0$ unless the routine detects an error or a warning has been flagged (see Section 6).

## 6 Error Indicators and Warnings

If on entry IFAIL $=0$ or -1 , explanatory error messages are output on the current error message unit (as defined by X04AAF).
Errors or warnings detected by the routine:
IFAIL $=1$
On entry, at least one value of X was invalid.
Check IVALID for more information.
IFAIL $=2$
On entry, $\mathrm{N}=\langle$ value $\rangle$.
Constraint: $\mathrm{N} \geq 0$.
IFAIL $=-99$
An unexpected error has been triggered by this routine. Please contact NAG.
See Section 3.8 in the Essential Introduction for further information.

IFAIL $=-399$
Your licence key may have expired or may not have been installed correctly.
See Section 3.7 in the Essential Introduction for further information.

IFAIL $=-999$
Dynamic memory allocation failed.
See Section 3.6 in the Essential Introduction for further information.

## $7 \quad$ Accuracy

Let $\delta$ and $\epsilon$ be the relative errors in the argument and result respectively.
If $\delta$ is somewhat larger than the machine precision (i.e., if $\delta$ is due to data errors etc.), then $\epsilon$ and $\delta$ are approximately related by:

$$
\epsilon \simeq\left|\frac{x K_{1}(x)}{K_{0}(x)}\right| \delta .
$$

Figure 1 shows the behaviour of the error amplification factor

$$
\left|\frac{x K_{1}(x)}{K_{0}(x)}\right|
$$

However, if $\delta$ is of the same order as machine precision, then rounding errors could make $\epsilon$ slightly larger than the above relation predicts.

For small $x$, the amplification factor is approximately $\left|\frac{1}{\ln x}\right|$, which implies strong attenuation of the error, but in general $\epsilon$ can never be less than the machine precision.

For large $x, \epsilon \simeq x \delta$ and we have strong amplification of the relative error. Eventually $K_{0}$, which is asymptotically given by $\frac{e^{-x}}{\sqrt{x}}$, becomes so small that it cannot be calculated without underflow and hence the routine will return zero. Note that for large $x$ the errors will be dominated by those of the standard function exp.
